




Your child will receive a home learning phonics book.


These books will include QR codes linked to your child's current phonics level, words to practice reading and other activities to complete to support their phonics learning.



QR codes will be linked to the sounds your child is currently working on in their phonics group

Practice sound sheets and practice words will be included to support their reading of words with the sound. Ask your child to Fred talk, read the word. When they are more confident, they can Fred in their head.

Using these phonics home learning books alongside listening to your child read at home, for at least 10 minutes each night, will help support your child in becoming a confident reader.

Listening to your child read

Three things to do

1. Ask your child to read the sounds and words before they read the story. They will enjoy teaching you to read these words too.
2. When your child reads the story, encourage them to read the word in Fred Talk if they hesitate or read it incorrectly. Praise them when they succeed.
3. Read back each sentence or page to keep the plot moving - your child's energy is going into reading the words not the story.

Three things *not* to do

1. Don't read the story to them first.
2. Don't ask your child to guess a word by looking the pictures.
3. And, importantly, please try not to become irritable if your child ever struggles! Keep smiling!
